ESTONIA

- There are **100 recycling centers**, where you can take your hazardous waste.
- Almost 90% of industrial hazardous waste came from **oil shale** extraction in East-Estonia.
- There have been large European projects to **neutralize pollution** of the Soviet era chemical industry (landfills, rivers).
- You can give used **batteries** away in supermarkets.
- Used **electronics** should be given to recycling centers for free.



SLOVENIA

- Hazardous waste represents 132.000t
- 2% of total waste is hazardous waste
- Things classified as hazardous waste are: paint, cleaning products, medicine, oil, chemicals, bateries, electronics
- Most of the waste comes from medical activity, construction and demolition.
- 1 landfill for hazardous waste
- Slovenia has a tax for hazardous waste (37.7€/t)
- Hazardous waste is recycled, burned as fuel or chemically changed
